alent Campus Durban is an intensive 5-day programme of workshops and seminars that will be delivered by film professionals, academics and intellectuals. In addition to specific activities offered by the Campus, the selected talents will have the opportunity to attend films and events at the 30th Durban International Film Festival.

Under the theme **Roots and Shoots: Creating a New African Cinema**, participating filmmakers will benefit from both theoretical and practical approaches to the art of film. Talent Campus Durban is held in cooperation with the Berlinale Talent Campus, the 7th edition of which formed part of the 59th Berlin International Film Festival in February this year. The Berlinale has in recent years exported the Talent Campus concept to selected festivals in other countries. Currently, apart from the main event in Berlin, Talent Campus takes place in Buenos Aires, Guadalajara and Sarajevo, and it is a considerable privilege and sign of success of our first campus, that DIFF has been invited to again host a Talent Campus in South Africa. This provides DIFF with an opportunity to expand its existing training programmes with an established global initiative that brings a group of promising, new African filmmakers together with seasoned professionals.

The call for entries to the Talent Campus Durban again targeted African filmmakers living in Africa, and the selection committee had a formidable choice of talents. In this period of economic upheaval the Talent Campus Durban, with its 40 participants representing 21 countries validates the art of African creativity with its strength of diversity. Production in these difficult economic times requires multi-tasking talent, combined with technical and financial acumen. Film is humanity's most collaborative art form and Talents from all campuses are making productive inroads to creative networks through this worldwide project. Already our inaugural Talent Campus Durban Talents have produced films that have gained entry into this year's film festival, thus proving the overall campus objective which is to empower a new generation of African filmmakers.

Talent Campus Durban is a partnership project between the Durban International Film Festival in cooperation with the Berlinale Talent Campus, Berlin International Film Festival, and is supported by the German Embassy in South Africa, the Goethe Institute, Department of Economic Development, KwaZulu-Natal and Art Moves Africa.

SCRIPT STATION:

Enjoying a long and distinguished career, Mtutuzeli Matshoba is a writer and teacher of extraordinary success (see page 13). Interested talents who submitted some writing were given two meetings of one hour each at the script station.

After the first meeting, the talent can take the opportunity to re-write the scene incorporating the discussion. During the second session, further development and discussion should help to refine the writing process. Script session meetings were planned in advance of the campus and meetings set up throughout the five days.

PITCHING SESSIONS:

A introductory session about the pitch process (101, 16:15-17:15, Friday, 24 July) with Clarence Hamilton (Head of Production and Development NFVF) is followed by two optional sessions.

During the sessions Project Pitching 201 (09h30-11h00, Saturday, 25 July) and Project Pitching 301 (09h30-11h00, Sunday, 26 July). Talents present a two to three minute focused pitch to panels consisting of four to five industry specialists made up of producers, distributors, directors and funders. Talent that pitch do so according to roster.

Two minutes may not seem like a long time, but it can be enough to introduce a project to the panel and begin a creative discussion. After the pitch, the industry experts will provide creative criticism on the pitch along the lines of their particular expertise. The talents who are observing will also be able to engage with the pitch and pitcher after the sessions.



TALENT CAMPUS EXPERTS



During the past fifteen years **JUNAID AHMED** (Filmmaker, Fineline Productions) has been writing, producing and directing documentaries, docu-drama's and short films for e-tv, SABC, Channel 4 and the Discovery Channel. His productions have featured in many international film

festivals and have also received many international awards. *Iqakamba-Hard Ball*, which he wrote and directed, won the best sports documentary at the Milan International FICTS Festival in 1996. *Lucky*, a short film that he produced, was nominated for the 2006 BAFTA Best Short Film award. This film subsequently won awards at over 38 international film festivals, including Clermont Ferrand, Cinequest San Jose and Aspen Shortsfest. Junaid also directed the feature Videovision docu-drama *More Than Just A Game* and features Presley Chweneyagae (*Tsotsi*), Wright Ngubeni and Tshepo Maseko. *More Than Just A Game* was released in South African theatres in April 2008 and Sony Pictures International has acquired the international world-wide distribution rights. Junaid is presently developing his first feature film.



PETER ANDERS, after studing Theatre, Philosophy and Psychology in Berlin, worked for the German Television ARD in Frankfurt/Main. In 1990 he started working for the Goethe-Institut in Munich where he was the Head of the Visual Arts Department vrom 1992. From 1994 until 2007 he was

Director of the Goethe-Instituts in Yaoundé (Cameroon), Salvador da Bahia (Brasil) and Sofia (Bulgaria). From 2007 he has been the Head of the Programme Department of the Goethe-Institut in Subsahara Africa, based in Johannesburg. He developed the new strategie of cultural activities in the region with focus on the inner regional exchange and the support of co-productions in all creative areas including theatre, dance, visual arts and film.



SEAN BAKER is an American writer, director, editor and cinematographer. His filmography includes *Four Letter Words* (2000) and *Take Out* (2004). He also wrote, and directed the cult television show *Greg the Bunny. Take Out*, Sean's second feature, premiered at the Slamdance Film

Festival, and won the Regal Cinemas Dreammaker Award and Best Feature Award at the Nashville Film Festival. *Prince Of Broadway*, Sean's third film (DIFF 2009), premiered at the

Los Angeles Film Festival where it won the Grand Jury Award for Best Narrative Feature. It was also the only US feature in competition at Locarno where it won a Special Jury Mention in the Filmmakers of the Present section. The film went on to win at Woodstock, Torino and Belfort. Sean is currently working on his fourth film *Left-Handed Girl*, which is a family drama set in Taiwan.

LOURENS BLOK makes his feature debut with this film, *The Seven of Daran – The Battle of Pareo Rock* (DIFF 2009). His previous work includes the short film *Life*, *Death and Airguitar* (2006). *The Seven of Daran* has won three international festival awards including the Golden Cairo at the Cairo International Film Festival.



NEIL BRANDT is one of South Africa's leading creative producers. He has taken to market a number of award-winning documentary films, including *Angola Saudades* (DIFF 2006), *The Mother's House* (DIFF 2007), *Solly's Story* (DIFF 2004), *History of South African Politics* and *Tsietsi My Hero* (DIFF 2004), which have won dozens of awards locally and



internationally, including Best Documentary Award at the SAFTA's, Durban International Film Festival, Three Continents Human Rights Festival, Cape Town World Cinema Festival, Munich International Documentary Festival and the Apollo Film Festival. He was also the associate producer on the Emmy Award winning documentary, *A Lion's Trail*. Together with producer Bridget Pickering he formed the successful Luna Films that focuses on telling unique African stories for both the local and international markets.

Director of the Audio Visual Division at the University of KwaZulu-Natal (AV UKZN), **JASPER CECIL** has a Masters in Music Technology, BA in Communication, Diplomas in Television Production and Journalism, and other technical qualifications. He teaches video production and is



responsible for the University's production facilities, which will also include Campus TV and Digital Signage. He trained in the UK at the University of Bristol, City of Bath College and the BBC, and has run, for seven years, the very successful and intensive four-day DIFF Video Production Workshop for first timers from

local community organisations, most of whom have never used a camera before. The AV-sponsored workshop is open to entrylevel people who have not worked in the industry but have a strong desire to pursue videography as a career option. Last year he was a jury member for Talent Campus Durban.



MARTIN CUFF has been involved in the promotion, marketing and development of film industries since 1997. He launched Martin Cuff Consulting in July 2006 and has since worked successfully on a range of Film Industry initiatives throughout Africa and beyond. Prior to the launch of Martin Cuff

Consulting, Martin's previous work experience has been at the Colorado Film Commission (as Executive Director) and then at the Cape Town Film Commission as Director and CEO. In 2003 he took over management of the Cape Town Film Permit Office and worked with the City to overhaul its permitting processes and develop the first formal film policy in Africa.



NANDITA DAS is an award-winning Indian film actress and independent filmmaker. As an actress, she is known for her critically acclaimed performances in Deepa Metha's Fire (1996), Earth (1998), Bawandar (2000) and Aamaar Bhuvan (2002). She won Best Actress at the Zee Cine Awards and Santa

Monica Film Festival for her performance in *Bawandar* (2000) as well as the Cairo International Film Festival for her role in Aamaar Bhuvan (2002). Firaaq was nominated for the Golden Alexander at Thessaloniki Film Festival where it won the Everyday Life Award. Her feature directorial debut in Firaaq, a film she also wrote, is screening at DIFF this year.




REHAD DESAI completed a history degree at the University of Zimbabwe where he lived for three years. In 1996, Rehad entered the television and film industry as a producer and focused much of his energy on historical and socio-political productions. In 1997, he completed his Masters in Social History at the University

of the Witwatersrand. In 2000, he completed a postgraduate degree in television and film producing through AVEA. Rehad is the South African board member for SACOD. His films include: Carlos Cardoso: An Independent Spirit, Dilemma, My Land My Life, Born Into Struggle (DIFF 2005), and Bushman's Secret (DIFF2007). In 2008, two of his films screened at DIFF, You Chuse (co-director) and Tapologo (co-producer).

born in 1951 in Chegutu, Zimabawe, He has been an actor on stage and screen. The

German film Whispering Death was the first movie he worked on as an actor and assistant director. After that he took part in many films including: Slavers, Month of the Doctors,



House of Hunger, Tuxedo Warrior, Jake Speed, King Solomon's Mines, Richard Attenborough's Cry Freedom, Mandela and many others. He worked as a trainer on the UNESCO/ Zimbabwe Film Training Project. Stephen has worked as a filmmaker in South Africa, Nigeria, Kenya, Tanzania, Ethiopia, United States, and France. He co-produced and directed his first feature film in 1991 called Pfuma Yedu. He has directed many documentaries on ecology, the environment, religion, social commentary and sports programmes. Chigorimbo became a household name in Zimbabwe as John Huni, a leading character in the runaway Zimbabwean soap Studio 63. Innumerable development projects have had Chingorimbo's touch and this work continues from his position as Regional Secretariat, FESPACI.

EDWIN studied graphic design in Surabava and film in Jakarta. He has made numerous short films, documentaries and music videos. His short film Kara, the Dauahter of the Tree (2005) was selected for the Cannes Directors Fortnight, the first Indonesian film to win this honour. His Blind Pia Who Wants To Flv is



in competition at DIFF 2009. It is his directorial debut, and was was nominated for the Tiger Award. It won the FIPRESCI Prize at the Rotterdam International Film Festival.

BASIL FORD (Head: Media and Motion Pictures SBu) of the Industrial Development Corporation of South Africa Ltd (IDC). The IDC is a self-financing, national Development Finance Institution (DFI). The Media unit has a portfolio of more than R500 million and it has been actively involved in the motion



pictures subsector with more than 70% of its portfolio invested in the subsector. The Media unit has invested in more than 30 motion pictures including Tsotsi, Red Dust, Hotel Rwanda, In My Country and Drum, Television programmes such as Jozi-H, and documentaries like Lions Trail; Ingrid Jonker; Sophiatown.

JULIE FREDERIKSE (Director of Vuleka Productions) is an award winning producer who has produced numerous films, television series, and documentaries for South African broadcasters. Julie was one of the producers



of *The Sky in Her Eyes*, which won Best African Short Film at the Cannes Film Festival's Critics Choice Week (2003), as well as awards in Milan and Montreal. She co-wrote *My Secret Sky* (Opening Night Film – DIFF 2009) which was selected for development at the 'Producing with the South' seminar by the French 3 Continents Film Festival in Nantes, Paris and Cannes in 2004-05 and by AVEA (Audio Visual Entrepreneurs of Africa) in 2002. A film and television mini-series for SABC 2, *Land of Thirst* won international distribution in a deal signed at MIPCOM, Cannes in 2007. Her international TV co-productions include series for *Sesame Workshop*, USA and Channel Four, UK.



REVEL FOX studied at The National Film and Television School in England. He has written, edited and directed for both film and television. He has directed feature films, documentaries, commercials, music videos, multi-camera drama and music concerts. Now based in South Africa, Revel has directed

Question of the Heart for M-Net New Directions, as well as 150 episodes of the daily drama Backstage and several documentaries about musicians. In 2004, Revel wrote and directed the feature film, The Flyer (DIFF 2005), which screened at many international festivals, including Locarno, London, Rio and Giffoni-Hollywood. It won six international awards, three of which were audience selection awards. Revel's newest project, Long Street (DIFF 2009) was invited to the Mannheim Meetings in Germany in 2006.



Australian **EMMA FRANZ** is a critically acclaimed professional jazz singer who has performed more than 50 times on Australian television and was a finalist in the prestigious 1998 Australian National Jazz Awards. She's worked extensively in various capacities on both narrative and documentary short and

feature films. She started her own production company, In the Sprocket Productions, in 2005. She worked as a production coordinator on *The Secret*, a documentary about the famous self help book of the same title. *Intangible Asset No. 82* (DIFF 2009) is her directorial debut.



RYAN HAIDARIAN is the son of Iranian immigrants to the USA. A graduate of the University of Texas at Austin, his first short film, *War* garnered immense heat in Los Angeles and Ryan went on to direct two other shorts, *Tattoo* and *Race*. *Race* headlined a symposium for President

Clinton's initiative on race. He has sold a television series for syndication, directed a series of television dramas, written an action comedy, produced a feature, shot several commercials and music videos, and directed the documentary *The Story*

of Darrel Royal that won many awards including an HBO/ Peabody Award. In 2003, Ryan moved to South Africa to direct commercials, including a CEO award winning PSA for the Amy Biehl Foundation. Ryan currently heads up New Ventures at the NFVF.

CLARENCE HAMILTON trained as a filmmaker at Ryerson Polytechnic in Toronto, and since his return to South Africa in 1992, has worked extensively as a writer, director and executive producer in the film and television industry. Among his credits are Molo Fish! Avoiding the Truth (1997) and Molo Fish II – Into the Unknown (2004); Takalani



Sesame, Gazlam, and Soul Buddyz. In 2005, Clarence became co-project leader in SEDIBA, a feature film and television script development programme of the NFVF. In 2006/7, he worked as script editor on Otelo Burning, a moving coming of age story set against the backdrop of the political strife of 1980s township life and The Fighting Prince, Norman Maake's first feature film with Focus Features. Clarence joined the NFVF in 2007 and presently heads their new Development and Production division.

MONICA HEMMING RORVIK (Assistant Manager, Durban International Film Festival/Talent Campus Adjudicator) has headed the DIFF workshop programme since 2000, the documentary selection for the last four years, and the short film



selection panel from 2001 until 2007. She has curated film for a number of events, including the African Union Film Festival in 2002, DIFF at the World Social Forum in Kenya 2007, and liaises closely with local and international festivals and film agencies, and does systems. She has also worked for the CCA during their four international film festivals.

SANDRA HERRINGTON has a PhD in Drama from the University of Natal, worked as a stage and radio actress, ran a theatre and lectured in drama before turning to television. She now heads Tekweni TV Productions and for the past 20 years has been scripting, directing and editing inserts and documentaries for



local and international television broadcast outlets. During this time she has won 62 national and international awards. Sandra has also served as the Durban Coordinator for all three of the Durban International Wild Talk Africa Festivals and at the last festival was nominated for an international ROSCAR award for her documentary *Dragon Mountains*. She has recently co-created and launched an internet TV site www.satvchannel.com which is a platform for filmmakers to profile and licence their work.



Twenty-five-year-old **OLIVER HERMANUS** studied Film, Media and Visual Studies at the University of Cape Town and has recently completed a Masters in Filmmaking at the London Film School. His highly acclaimed debut feature film *Shirley Adams* will be premiering in competition at DIFF this year

and has just been accepted into the Lorcano Film Festival.



WANURI KAHIU was born in Nairobi, Kenya, and holds a Bachelor of Science Degree from the University of Warwick as well as a Master of Fine Arts from the University of California. She won the Motion Pictures of America Associates Award as well as the Hollywood Foreign Press Award

After completion of her Masters, Wanuri directed a behind-the-scenes documentary, *The Spark that Unites* for the film *Catch A Fire* directed by Phillip Noyce, starring Derek Luke and Tim Robbins. MTUTUZELI MATSHOBA (Talent Campus Script-doctor/DIFF Indigenous Language Scriptwriting Course) is a prolific South African writer famous for his protest literature and for being one of the founding members of the legendary Raven Press, and a contributor to the frequently

banned (under Apartheid) Staff rider Magazine. His short stories eventually attracted the attention of filmmakers, which resulted in him moving into scriptwriting. In a long and distinguished career Matshoba has been involved in the creation and writing of famous South African television productions such as Soweto, The History, Yizo Yizo, Stokvel, Scoop Scoombie, and Zero Tolerance. He graduated to feature film with the much acclaimed comedy Chikin Biznis, which won Best Film in FESPACO in Burkina Faso. He has also been involved in polishing the scripts for Red Dust and, more recently, Jerusalema (DIFF 2008 Audience Award Winning film).

KHALIPHA EDDIE MBALO, Chief Executive Officer: National Film and Video Foundation, Ministry of Arts and Culture, started his career as a young activist who wanted to use the medium of television to tell the South African story. He formed his own company in 1984 and worked as



a freelancer for foreign agencies like ABC News, World Wide Television News and others at the height of strict media restrictions. TONI MONTY has been involved in the South African media and entertainment industry for over 10 years. She currently heads up the Durban Film Office, a special purpose vehicle of the eThekwini Municipality, established in 2003 to spearhead the development of the local

film sector. MADODA NCAYIYANA (Director, Vuleka Productions/Talent Campus Adjudicator) is a veteran of radio, television and video productions, as well as film, mainly as a director but also as an actor and producer. Madoda has a background in theatre and has directed, written and performed



productions at festivals throughout Europe and Africa, including the Edinburgh festival, where he won the prestigious Scotsman Award, and South Africa's Grahamstown festival, where he has won awards for acting and writing. He has directed all of Vuleka's award-winning productions, including *The Sky in Her Eyes*, which won Best African Short Film at the Cannes Film Festival (2003). He is the director of *My Secret Sky/Izula Lami* (Opening film DIFF 2009).



AKIN OMOTOSO is a Nigerian-born South African actor, writer and director best known for his role as Khaya Motene in the SABC 1 soapie *Generations*. Whilst studying drama at the University of Cape Town, he won The Fleur du Cap Award for Most Promising Student in 1995 for his role in the play and

decided to pursue a career in the performing arts. In 1999 he wrote his first feature film, *God is African* (DIFF 2005). In 2003 he started a production company, T.O.M Pictures with Robbie Thorpe and Kgomotso Matsunyane. The company's first project was producing Craig Freimond's film *Gums and Noses* (DIFF 2004), which went on to win Best South African Film at the New York Independent Film Festival in 2004. *Jesus and the Giant* (DIFF 2009) is Akin's latest short film.



UBERTO PASOLINI began his career working as an assistant director after which he worked in the international marketing and distribution departments of Twentieth Century Fox. He went on to carve out a career in producing and has worked on numerous films including *The Full Montv*

(1997) and *The Emperor's New Clothes* (2001). *Machan* (DIFF 2009 Competition Feature) is his directorial debut.



PRASHANT PETHE is a merchant navy officer turned producer who has also worked as an amateur actor. He is the producer of *The Damned Rain* (DIFF 2009 Competition Feature) which he produced using his savings and funding from the distribution grant given by the Hubert Bal

Fund. The Damned Rain is to date the only Indian film to get funding from the Hubert Bal Fund, from the prestigious Rotterdam International Film Festival. Prashant was also coproducer of the highly acclaimed film, Valu.



BHEKIZIZWE PETERSON is the Associate Professor of African Literature at the University of the Witwatersrand. He has been active as a participant and commentator on Black cultural practices since the late seventies. He has held Fellowships at Yale University and Birmingham University. He has sat on

various editorial, statutory and artistic committees, juries and boards across the continent. He has published extensively on African Literature, Performance, Cultural Studies and Black Intellectual Traditions in South Africa. His books include Monarchs, Missionaries and African Intellectuals: African

Fence (Holland), Nu Image, Harmony Gold, Franklin Waterman Entertainment, Atlantis Films (Canada), Cine City Productions, Arsinio Hall Communications, Kings Road Entertainment, Columbia Tristar, Unapix Entertainment and Miramax. Previously, Paul was the Managing Director of Moviworld in South Africa and has been involved in the production of film in South Africa for over thirty years. He has overseen and produced dozens of feature films and television series, both local and international. Some notable productions include Acadamy Award-Winning Tsotsi (DIFF 2006), Stander, A Reasonable Man, The Hangman's Daughter-Texas Blood Money (Quentin Tarantino series of films for Miramax), and Born Free (Columbia Tri-Star).



PETER RORVIK is director of the Durban International Film Festival (DIFF) where his role includes fundraising, festival design, planning and operational oversight, strategic initiatives, such as the forthcoming Durban FilmMart as well as film selection. DIFF is a flagship project of

the Centre for Creative Arts which Rorvik has headed since 1999. Based within the University of KwaZulu-Natal, the CCA facilitates creative platforms and economic opportunities for artists and related industries, intercultural exchange and network development, training, audience development and strategic Pan-African and international cooperation in the cultural sectors. The CCA also produces three other major annual festivals – Time of the Writer, Jomba! Contemporary Dance Experience and Poetry Africa.



LLOYD ROSS has a strong background as a sound recordist and music composer for film and has won many awards in this field for work dating back as far as the 1980s. He was a founder and producer of the record label, Shifty Records, which recorded politically aware musicians of

the 80's including Vusi Mahlasela, Sankomota and Tananas. He moved back to video, shooting and directing music videos and then began making documentaries, many of which featured music. His filmography includes the titles Voëlvry, Famous for not being Famous, Singers and Swenkas, 10 Gears of Change, Messy States, An American in Sophiatown, Mans Peril and The Silver Fez (DIFF, 2009). He has also done a lot of features for the Al Jazeera English channel and produced music albums by both Rian Malan and Vusi Mahlasela.

More Than Just A Game (DIFF 2008), the Oscar-nominated, Yesterday, (DIFF 2004 opening film) Red Dust, Mama Jack, Mr Bones, The Long Run and The Mangler. Under Sanjeev's stewardship, Videovision Entertainment has become the leading independent film distribution company in South Africa, which has acquired high profile, Oscar winning films, such as Spirited Away (Best Film award at DIFF 2003), The March Of The Penguins, Pan's Labyrinth (DIFF 2007 closing film), and Paradise Now (DIFF 2005 opening film). His expertise in the film industry was recognised with an appointment as a councillor of the NFVF.

One of the great African filmmakers, CHEICK OUMAR SISSOKO (DIFF 2009 International Jury) is a director and politician from Mali. He has a DEA in African History and Sociology as well as a Diploma in History and Cinema from Ecole des hautes études en sciences socials with his further studies done at Ecole nationale



Louis Lumiére. He is the winner of two Etalon de yennenga awards at FESPACO, the first for *Guimba* (1995) and the other for *La Genése* (1999) while his adaptation of the Amanita Sow Fall's *Battù* won him the RFI prize at the same festival in 2001. In 1996, he founded a political party, African Solidarity for Democracy and Independence along with Oumar Mariko. He became the Malian Minister of Culture in 2002 and remained in this position until the end of 2007.

Internationally acclaimed cartoonist, animator and journalist **NANDA SOOBBEN**, has been plying his trade for over 25 years. Nanda is the founder/creative director of the Centre for Fine Art, Animation and Design in Durban. His socio-political statements, cartoons and illustrations have



been printed in many South African newspapers, and are syndicated to newspapers internationally. Nanda has received many prestigious awards: an honorary life membership of the Brazilian Academy of Fine Art (1987), the Nataraja Award from the Arupta Khazaghum (1999), Vodacom Journalist of the Year (KZN) (2006/2008), The City of San Francisco and a US Congressional Award, presented by Nancy Pelosi (2007) and the Silver Tusk Award for outstanding DUT Alumni (2008).



Worldwide Head of Production for Anant Singh's Videovision Entertainment, **HELENA SPRING** has produced more than sixty television projects and some twenty feature films. Her most recent motion picture credits as producer include *More than Just a Game* (DIFF

2008), Prey (DIFF 2007), Faith's Corner (DIFF 2005 opening film), the Academy Award nominated Yesterday (DIFF 2004 opening film), the South African hit Mr. Bones, The Long Run, The Theory of Flight and Bravo Two Zero (as co-producer), a BBC co-production. Helena also executive produced the comedy drama, Get Real, which won the Best Picture award at the British Film Festival of Dinard in France, and the 1998 Trophée Hitchcock D'Or, Trophée Hitchcock Audience Award, and the Trophée Hitchcock Kodak Cinematography Award. She further executive produced features such as Waati by Palme D'Or winner Souleymane Cisse, The Mangler by Tobe Hooper, Katinka Heyns' Paljas and Darrell James Roodt's Sarafina!



NADIA SUJEE heads the Creative Industries unit in the Enterprise and Industry Development Division of the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI). She has developed sector strategies and programmes for the film and television sub sector, as well as the craft sub sector. She is currently involved in

a process of strategy development for the music and design sectors for the DTI as well as work in the film and television sector with regards to the Film and Television Production rebate. Nadia is also involved in enterprise support as well as distribution infrastructure.



Durban-born **RAMADAN SULEMAN** was one of the founders of the Dhlomo Theatre in Johannesburg, South Africa's first 'black' run theatre. He studied film directing in Paris and the London International Film School. Suleman has directed several documentaries and films. His film. Fools

received the Silver Leopard at Locarno in 1997 and Zulu Love Letter has won a number of international awards, including a special mention at DIFF 2005. His book, Zulu Love Letter, co-written by Bhekizizwe Peterson, is being launched at DIFF 2009 along with the world premier of his latest feature documentary, Zwelidumli.

Cameroonian **JEAN-MARIE TENO** has been living in France since 1977, where he studied audio-visual communication at the University of Valenciennes. After graduating in 1981, he worked as a film critic for Buana Magazine, then as an editor for France's FR3 network. Jean-Marie is one of Africa's



pre-eminent documentary filmmakers, producing and directing films on the colonial and post-colonial history of Africa for over twenty years. His films have been honoured at major festivals worldwide and he was on the international jury for DIFF 2007. Jean-Marie has been a guest of the Flaherty Seminar, an artist in residence at the Pacific Film Archive of the University of California, Berkeley, and has lectured at numerous universities. Most recently, he was a visiting artist at Amherst College as a 2007-08 Copeland Fellow.

T.O.M. Pictures was founded in 2003 by **ROBBIE THORPE**, Akin Omotoso, and Kgomotso Matsunyane, and has very quickly established a reputation as one of the most progressive, creative and professional production companies in South Africa. T.O.M. Pictures has



produced hundreds of hours of television drama, including *Sorted, Nomzamo, A Place Called Home* and *Soul Buddyz.*Documentaries include *Gathering the Scattered Cousins, The Dust on Our Feet* and *Famous For Not Being Famous,* and feature films include *Gums & Noses* (DIFF 2007), *God is African* (DIFF 2005) and the *Silver Fez* (DIFF 2009). Robbie is currently producing *Skin* with director Craig Friedmond.

CHRISTINE TRÖSTRUM (Project Manager, Berlinale Talent Campus) was born in Ravensburg, Germany and studied cultural and theatre studies and cultural communication in Berlin. She has worked as a curator for film festivals in Tübingen, Augsburg and Marseille. From 1998 to 2000



she was project manager at the European Film Centre in Babelsberg, where she was responsible for the CyberCinema pilot project, the first worldwide demonstrator for D-cinema, and for the 'A Working Culture II' conference during the German EU presidency of 1999. She has also been the event manager of Cartoon Movie, a financing market for animation films, and through 2005 project manager of the Berlin-Brandenburg Media Week at the Berlin-Brandenburg Media Board. Since 2004, Christine has worked for the Berlinale Talent Campus, of which she assumed general management together with Matthijs Wouter Knol in 2008.



SAVO TUFEGDZIC has been involved in the South African arts industry for nearly 20 years in various capacities. In 1993 he took over the Black Sun Theatre, producing, marketing and directing plays, and also made two short films, *Mother's Day* and *Street Dimensions* and a documentary.

Street Dimensions was also turned into a play which was produced at the Windybrow Theatre, where Savo eventually worked for three years.
